Traditional Student Scholarships

Merit scholarships are awarded to traditional, *full-time first-year* students based on academic criteria that is evaluated during admissions process. Scholarship is awarded regardless of documented status. For more information contact above admissions office representative.

Transfer Student Scholarships

Merit scholarships are awarded to full-time transfer students based on their cumulative GPA from all transfer institutions. Scholarship is awarded regardless of documented status. For more information contact above admissions office representative.

Financial Aid - How to fill out the FAFSA

- Do not falsify applications or other documents. Do not use identification or documents belonging to someone else on your application, as this constitutes fraud. Meet with a financial aid officer of the college in order to determine the level of aid you may receive.
- Without a Social Security Number, you are ineligible for federal aid. However, if you do have a Social Security Number, you should submit a FAFSA.
- “The FAFSA does not require the citizenship status of the applicant’s parents, but does request their SSNs. Applicants must write in “000-00-0000” as the SSN for any parent or legal guardian who is undocumented. Applicants will encounter the following question: “Are you a U.S. citizen?” Undocumented students must check the box for “No, I am not a citizen or eligible noncitizen.” The form also features questions about the “legal state of residence” for the applicant and their parents. The correct answer will vary, as each U.S. state has different requirements for legal state residency. Applicants should consult their high school career counselor before completing this section. The online FAFSA form features an IRS Data Retrieval tool that allows applicants to submit their tax information and that of their parents. If the applicant or their parents did not file an income tax return during the previous year, then tax information may be entered manually.”
